Summer is coming! Beaches are calling us! Mountains are calling us! Cruises are calling us! What is calling you right now? These really sound good, but on one side, summer can make our thoughts, minds, and spirits very distracted. Yes, we may be overwhelmed. Or we may treat very important messages as noise. We may feel confused every day. We may need a cup of bold coffee.

Here is an example of what my friend experienced. After he graduated from seminary, he started a new church in CA. He was very excited to start his new ministry, and he wanted to make his first service beautiful. Not to make a mistake, he made a check list and began to prepare for the service. Invitation cards—Check! Bulletin—Check! Food and snacks—Check! Cleaning the church—Check! Pastor's robe—Check! You can name it. He worked hard until very late at night before the Service. Finally, everything was checked except printing the bulletins.

So, he printed them at 5:00 am and was about to sleep for at least 3-4 hours before the service. However, suddenly he realized that he did not do the most important thing. He forgot to prepare for his sermon!!

Yes, there are so many things going on around us and so many voices talking to us in our world. True voices and false voices are mixed up, and we need to work hard to sort out the truth from the lies. In this situation, what if we treated Jesus' voice as noise and ignored it!!

Even though God's voice seems very soft, it is very clear. Through the Holy Spirit, God is telling us that God is remembering us. God is telling us that God loves us to death. My pain and your pain became God's pain. God loves you and me not only in words. God loves you and me in action and the truth. God is patient with you and me. God is kind to you and me. God does not easily get angry with you and me. God is proud of you and me. God is joyful when you and I are doing good things. God has not given up hope for you and me. Like this, in the love of God's belly button, God lives in you and me, and we live in God. We became one.

My mom taught me how to become one with God and others in Christ and why we need to invite God and others to cross our boundary. When I was a junior in high

school, I had a bad day at school and came home in a grumpy mood. So, I went to my room without saying anything to my mother. My mother came to me and asked what was wrong. I was not feeling good and said to her, "Mom, you don't need to know about my school life. I am not a baby." At that time, my mom said to me. "Daughter, please come here." With a grumpy face, I went to mom and sat by her. Then she asked, "Where is your belly button?" I said, "Mom, I am not a baby." She responded, "Yes, you are not a baby. So, you know that your belly button was once connected to me. Even though we are physically separated, you and I are still connected by your emotional belly button. I can feel your pain. Please share it with me." Through this experience, I learned that we are connected to God by our spiritual belly button. We share everything with God and with God's creatures. It means we are connected to God, and in God, my belly button and your belly button are connected to each other as a sister and a brother.

We should not forget this connection to God and this connection between you and me. To maintain this, we really need to discipline our spirit. Since the world and our church has been suffering from the division, we need spiritual exercise to not to take in this spirit of division and chaos. We hear a lot of noises during our day. If this is so, what do we have to do? Yes, we should turn off the noises. But it is not enough. We need to focus on God. So, for me, I set my alarm every three hours. To bring my focus to God, I stop everything I am doing. Then I exhale

deeply and try to let my busy mind go. Then when I inhale, I began to pray the Lord's Prayer very slowly and digest every word. Could you join this exercise every day? Besides this, there are so many ways to increase our focus on God. From June 20-22, the VA conference will have its annual conference at the Berglund Center in Roanoke. To increase our focus and connection to God and God's people, we have worked together collecting cans and health and school supply kits. Even though we can enjoy our summer activities, we can also increase our spirit's muscles and increase the connection with God. Please don't forget that there are early prayer times at both churches: Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 7:00 am at Relief and Saturday, 7:30 am at Mt. Olive. Both churches have prayer meetings during the day: The second and fourth Wednesdays of the month at 11 am at Mt. Olive, and once a month at Relief. So, we cannot make any excuses not to discipline our spirits. I would like to invite you to set up a summer goal how to make your spiritual muscles strong. Let's remember God on the beach or wherever we go. We cannot depend on others to increase our spiritual muscles so let's work to get spiritual "beach bodies!"



## JUNE 2019 OUTREACH SPOTLIGHT

On Wednesday, May 8<sup>th</sup>, Robin Sweet, Eunice Musser and I visited with the Our Family group. The group made memory boxes for Mother's Day. They covered and decorated wooden cigar boxes. They were beautiful when they finished them. On June 12<sup>th</sup> — they will be making a Father's Day gift.

The Outreach emphasis for June is the annual CONFERENCE Offering. This is an offering that is received at one of the Worship Services at Annual Conference. The Bishop sets a goal and determines where the money will be sent. This year's goal is \$150,000 and the recipients will be: Africa University Student Scholarships — \$40,000, Cambodia Pastors' Leadership Training — \$40,000, Mozambique Lay Leadership Training — \$20,000, Brazil "Shade and Fresh Water" children's program — \$20,000, and Just Neighbors Funds Grant for Immigrant Legal Counsel in four districts — \$30,000.

If you would like to donate to this offering, all funds need to be turned in **no later than June 9<sup>th</sup>**. If writing a check, make sure a note—conference offering on the check.

Also just a reminder: Conference Hygiene kits, cleaning kits, and/or money for kits or shipping **MUST be in by June 9<sup>th</sup>**.

### Cans for Conference

Must be brought by June 16<sup>th</sup>, so either Seung Hae or our Conference delegate, Maria Cuccio can take them to Conference. .

These will be given to the Roanoke Rescue Mission. Suggested Items are:

1 can of meat; 1 can of vegetables and/or fruit; 1 can of soup and/or stew; 1 can that have a pop-top; boxes of nonperishables such as pasta, rice, cereals, peanut butter—plastic jars only. Please put these items also in the Senior Adult Classroom. These are due on or before June 16<sup>th</sup>. Also, if you have a recyclable bag—such as the ones purchased from grocery stores, or those handed out at events, these are appreciated also.

Don't forget there is a box in the back office for used eyeglasses and hearing aids.

The box in the vestibule is for C-CAP items only. Every first Sunday any money left on the Communion railing goes to C-CAP as well.

Also this month: The Point 90.1 is on our spotlight list. This is a local Christian Radio Station (the old WTRM), which is now located in Middletown. One of their projects is to improve audio stream. They are upgrading the equipment, and now are available through an app. Because of internet they can be heard in Asia, Africa, England, Ireland, and across the USA. They are also installing equipment to enhance listening locally.

Shenandoah Area on Aging recently sponsored a fundraiser to help purchase a van to transport wheelchair bound members to their active living centers, and to also help continue to provide Meals on Wheels for local homebound seniors. The Outreach Team voted to send \$200, to help with this project.
