My sisters and brothers, human life may need control, but it is true we often lose control. When we lose control, we feel frustrated because we don't know what to do and may hurt each other because we don't want to be losers. So, we need a God who is in control and comes to us in our times of need. However, God may seem to be silent and God's presence seems to fade away in our tough moments. So, we may feel anxious and work hard to find solutions for ourselves.

I also tried to solve a problem for myself. After I finished my doctoral degree, I tried to be ordained as a pastor. I was convinced God called me to be a pastor since I was seven years old, but my previous conference challenged my calling since I was over educated, and many churches don't want female pastors. My calling was shaken, and I was desperate to get a job to pay bills. So, I took control of my situation and applied to teaching positions at seminaries. One school really liked me after our phone interview and invited me to have a final interview at their campus in NY. Yes, I was so excited to be a New Yorker, and prepared for the interview

perfectly. My interview went very well and I even lectured a class. Ten days later, the school contacted me and said that it had been a hard choice. Unfortunately, they chose a senior colleague who I knew personally. She told me later that she knew the dean of the school, and the school had already promised to hire her even before she had an interview with them. Ouch! Through this "ouch" experience, I could reflect on my level of trust in God's call. Honestly, I did not completely trust that God is almighty enough to remove any obstacles in God's time. Because of my lack of faith, I felt like I had been drowning in bitter water and had to get out of it myself. Also, I realized that this failure could become a blessing to me and God's people. A few months later, our former Bishop invited my husband and me to the VA conference. Now I'm the proud pastor of our church.

This experience reminds me of the scripture; [27](#)Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life? <sup>33</sup>But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. <sup>34</sup>There-

fore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. (Matt. 6:27& 34) Our anxiety and desire to control every situation should go away. Rather, our anxious desires should be transformed to give God some space to let God's will be done.

This reflection can be applied to our special session of General Conference, too. I was biting my nails as I watched it over the internet. Since 2016, our bishops have done their best to embrace various opinions in the church and suggested the "One Church Plan." This plan gives more freedom to local churches and local pastors. But, delegates in to the General Conference defeated the One Church Plan and passed the Traditional Plan, which stands strongly against LGBTQ+ sisters and brothers. The vote difference between two plans was only 50 out of the 822 cast. I could see two extreme opposing feelings. Some people felt happy that the delegates made a decision which supported their opinion. They felt the vote meant God had affirmed their beliefs. Some people were heartbroken because the decision affirmed the exclusion of LGBTQ from the body of Christ. The decision in our GC created a chain of division and bitterness that may threaten the ministry and growth of the United Methodist Church in the United States.

I believe that what God really wanted to see was *not* which plan we would support. **God really wanted to see how we can bring God's heart of love to those who may have different beliefs because God loves EVERYBODY and everybody is a SINNER.**

**God really wants us to make the church a safe and loving home for everybody.** Regardless of how many votes your belief received, **we need to resist either a defeated spirit or a self-righteous spirit.** We need to remember that because our control is not perfect and limited, we easily hurt our sisters and brothers, especially those with different viewpoints. I am writing this with a heavy heart because I clearly saw that the body of Christ, from the local church level to the conference level, has been divided. Our attempt to control the situation failed and hurt our sisters and brothers.


My sisters and brothers, please stop trying to control everything with your beliefs, thinking, and actions. Please be open to God and listen to each other. God is waiting to work until we shut up and listen to God and each other. Then God will accomplish this promise for us.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent is a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline.

Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human morality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us to realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

During some Ash Wednesday services, the minister will lightly rub the sign of the cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers. The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship. Historically, ashes signified purification and sorrow for sins.

It is traditional to save the palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday service to burn to produce ashes for this service. Sometimes a small card or piece of paper is distributed on which each person writes a sin or hurtful or unjust characteristic. The cards are then brought to the altar to be burned with the palm branches. The ash cross on the forehead is an outward sign of our sorrow and repentance for sins.

## MARCH 2019 SPOTLIGHT

The March Outreach emphasis is the C-CAP Easter Baskets. Easter Baskets are now available for filling. These baskets can be filled with candy, school supplies, personal items, such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, combs, socks, gum, etc.

Also, other suggested items are puzzles, games, coloring books, children books, small bibles, bible story books, play doh, balls, marbles, small cars, jump ropes, or other items that are available at local stores, such as Dollar Tree or Dollar General. Basically, the items are about the same as those that are put in the Samaritan Purse Shoeboxes except candy and toothpaste are allowed. These baskets do not need to be wrapped. The Outreach Committee will wrap them and deliver them to C-CAP. We need to have all the baskets filled and **returned on or before, Sunday, April 7<sup>th</sup>**. As soon as the baskets are filled please bring them and put them either on the front pews in the Sanctuary or in the Willing Workers Classroom (the room beside the elevator). Committee members will deliver the baskets to C-CAP the week of April 8<sup>th</sup>. The baskets will be distributed by C-CAP on Saturday, April 13<sup>th</sup>.

A special thanks for your help with this outreach project. The children in the area will certainly enjoy receiving one of these baskets. For many this will be the only thing they will receive for Easter. Inside the basket we will be putting a cross in the pocket and a church brochure.
